NEC STUDENTS COMBAT STORMWATER STUDENTS BECOME THE EDUCATORS



Biltmore Hills and Rochester Heights are two communities within the Walnut Creek watershed that suffer the effects of stormwater runoff. This type of water pollution occurs when rainwaters wash over surfaces like parking lots and bare fields, carrying all surface pollutants with it—including gasoline, fertilizers, oil, litter, and more—right into the nearby creek. For Biltmore Hills and

Rochester Heights, that creek is prone to flooding their lands during rain events. The Neighborhood Ecology Corps has spent several weeks working with Christy Perrin of the Water Resources Research Institute to understand the issues with stormwater runoff and develop presentations on the topic to educate the public. This month they presented their findings to parents, but in the coming months they will speak to local

community members as well. Topics include the water cycle, rain gardens, river basin terminology, an enviroscape demonstration, and ways we at home can decrease stormwater pollution and runoff. St. Ambrose Episcopal church has been gracious enough to allow our students to use their facilities and show off their new rain garden during student presentations.



LINCOLN HEIGHTS LEAVES THE CLASSROOM 3RD GRADERS VENTURE OUTSIDE

As a continuing partnership with Lincoln Heights Elementary, C.H.E.R. led some outdoor activities this month with the school's 65 3rd grade students. The focus was on trees and soil, as per their state essential


GODDESS GATHERING
